AN ACT

- Amending Title 66 (Public Utilities) of the Pennsylvania 1 Consolidated Statutes, in rates and distribution systems, 2 providing for waiver of laws, regulations and policies under 3 commission's jurisdiction. 5 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 6 hereby enacts as follows: 7 Section 1. Title 66 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated 8 Statutes is amended by adding a section to read: § 1331. Waiver of laws, regulations and policies under commission's jurisdiction. 10 11 (a) Authorization. -- Notwithstanding any other provision of 12 law, a public utility may petition to the commission for a 13 waiver to any provision of this title, other laws of this Commonwealth under the commission's jurisdiction or regulations 14 15 or policy statements of the commission if the waiver enables the 16 public utility to reduce its ratepayer impact and operate in a more effective, efficient or economical manner. 17
 - (b) Petition. -- In order to receive a waiver under this

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- 1 section, a public utility shall petition the commission in a
- 2 form and manner determined by the commission. The public utility
- 3 shall include all of the following information in the petition:
- 4 (1) The specific provisions to waive, the need for the
- 5 <u>waiver and the length of time the waiver will be in place.</u>
- 6 (2) Supporting data to explain the benefit of obtaining
- 7 the waiver and the estimated cost savings to the public
- 8 <u>utility and avoided costs to the ratepayers. If the petition</u>
- 9 for a waiver is part of an approved rate case, an explanation
- for how the estimated cost savings will be utilized to reduce
- 11 <u>future costs incurred by ratepayers.</u>
- 12 <u>(3) An evaluation procedure to determine the</u>
- 13 <u>effectiveness of the waiver or the program that will be</u>
- instituted due to the waiver.
- 15 (4) A statement indicating how safety and reliability
- 16 <u>standards will be maintained or exceeded by the public</u>
- 17 utility if the petition is approved by the commission.
- 18 (5) Other information related to the petition as
- 19 requested by the commission.
- 20 (c) Review and order.--
- 21 (1) The commission, after notice and hearing, shall
- 22 enter an order granting or denying the petition within 60
- 23 <u>days of the filing date or within 150 days of the filing date</u>
- 24 if a protest is timely filed. If the commission fails to
- enter an order within the time period specified under this
- 26 paragraph, the petition shall be deemed granted.
- 27 (2) In making its determination, the commission shall
- limit its consideration to the financial impact of the
- 29 particular rate class indicated in the petition.
- 30 (d) Annual report. -- The commission shall prepare an annual

- 1 report listing each request for a waiver and the commission's
- 2 <u>determination to grant or deny each petition for a waiver under</u>
- 3 this section. The commission shall submit the annual report to
- 4 the chair and minority chair of the Consumer Protection and
- 5 Professional Licensure Committee of the Senate and the chair and
- 6 minority chair of the Consumer Protection, Technology and
- 7 Utilities Committee of the House of Representatives and post the
- 8 <u>annual report on the commission's publicly accessible Internet</u>
- 9 <u>website.</u>
- 10 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
