AN ACT

1 Designating a bridge, identified as Bridge Key 8537, carrying
2 Pennsylvania Route 869 over a tributary of the Little
3 Conemaugh River in Jackson Township, Cambria County, as the
4 Sergeant Vance Stephan Keslar Memorial Bridge; designating a
5 bridge, identified as Bridge Key 8392, carrying Pennsylvania
6 Route 53 over Bruebaker Run in Dean Township, Cambria County,
7 as the U.S. Army Technical Sergeant Joseph F. Johnston
8 Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge
9 Key 43267, on that portion of State Route 3041, also known as
10 Dishong Mountain Road, over U.S. Route 22 in Jackson
11 Township, Cambria County, as the Technical Sergeant Mike
12 Capelli Memorial Bridge; ~~and making a repeal.~~ DESIGNATING A <--
13 BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 45701, CARRYING PENNSYLVANIA
14 ROUTE 403 OVER THE CONEMAUGH RIVER BETWEEN JOHNSTOWN CITY AND
15 WEST TAYLOR TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY, AS THE CAPTAIN RAYMOND
16 W. CALLAHAN, JR., MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE,
17 IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 8569, CARRYING STATE ROUTE 1021 OVER
18 GLENDALE LAKE IN WHITE TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY, AS THE CPL
19 REID REX ROSS 3 BT 26 MARINE REG. MEMORIAL BRIDGE;
20 DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 56008,
21 CARRYING PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 403 OVER STONYCREEK RIVER IN
22 JOHNSTOWN CITY, CAMBRIA COUNTY, AS THE SGT. JOHN C. ALAIMO
23 MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE
24 KEY 8444, CARRYING US ROUTE 219 OVER PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 56,
25 ALSO KNOWN AS SCALP AVENUE, IN RICHLAND TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA
26 COUNTY, AS THE PFC STANLEY ALBERT STYS MEMORIAL BRIDGE;
27 DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 8547, LOCATED
28 ON STATE ROUTE 1002, ALSO KNOWN AS FRIEND LEA ROAD, OVER U.S.
29 ROUTE 219 IN CAMBRIA TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY, AS THE PFC
30 CYRIL T. YECKLEY MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE,
31 IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 8654, CARRYING STATE ROUTE 3035 OVER
32 THE LITTLE CONEMAUGH RIVER IN EAST TAYLOR TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA
33 COUNTY, AS THE EAST TAYLOR TOWNSHIP VETERANS MEMORIAL BRIDGE;

1 DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 43558,
2 CARRYING U.S. ROUTE 22 OVER A TRIBUTARY OF HINCKSTON RUN IN
3 JACKSON TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY, AS THE OFFICER MATTHEW
4 KRUPA MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS
5 BRIDGE KEY 55994, CARRYING STATE ROUTE 4002 OVER CALIFORNIA
6 RUN IN CAMBRIA TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY, AS THE SENIOR CHIEF
7 STANLEY "STUSH" KUBAT, JR., MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A
8 BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 46706, CARRYING STATE ROUTE
9 4001, ALSO KNOWN AS IVERSON ROAD, OVER STEVENS RUN IN
10 BLACKLICK TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY, AS THE PVT DONALD D.
11 MARSH MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS
12 BRIDGE KEY 19716, CARRYING STATE ROUTE 2019 OVER MAHONING
13 CREEK IN BELL TOWNSHIP, JEFFERSON COUNTY, AS THE SP4 MICHAEL
14 RAYMOND ISHMAN MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE,
15 IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 5550, CARRYING WOODBURY PIKE
16 (PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 36) OVER HALTER CREEK, SPANNING BLAIR AND
17 FREEDOM TOWNSHIPS, BLAIR COUNTY, AS THE PVT. WILLIAM E. GREEN
18 MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE
19 KEY 41606, CARRYING STATE ROUTE 3011, ALSO KNOWN AS BRANCH
20 ROAD, OVER SPRING CREEK IN COLLEGE TOWNSHIP, CENTRE COUNTY,
21 AS THE PETTY OFFICER JOHN W. COBLE MEMORIAL BRIDGE;
22 DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 46159,
23 CARRYING PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 36 ON CHARGER HIGHWAY, BLAIR
24 TOWNSHIP, BLAIR COUNTY, AS THE MARINE LANCE CORPORAL RALPH
25 HAMMEL MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS
26 BRIDGE KEY 52767, CARRYING WEST HIGH STREET (STATE ROUTE
27 4031), CROSSING THE GHOST TOWN TRAIL, LOCATED IN EBENSBURG
28 BOROUGH, CAMBRIA COUNTY, AS THE CORPSMAN CHARLES DOERR,
29 UNITED STATES NAVY, MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE,
30 IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 11781, ON THAT PORTION OF STATE
31 ROUTE 3004 OVER THE WEST BRANCH SUSQUEHANNA RIVER, BURNSIDE
32 TOWNSHIP, CLEARFIELD COUNTY, AS THE UNITED STATES ARMY
33 SERGEANT HAROLD KOLLER MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE,
34 IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 8555, CARRYING STATE ROUTE 1007 OVER
35 CHEST CREEK ON THE BORDER OF ALLEGHENY TOWNSHIP AND EAST
36 CARROLL TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY, AS THE SERGEANT REGIS H.
37 DRISKEL MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A PORTION OF
38 PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 143 IN LYNN TOWNSHIP, LEHIGH COUNTY, FROM
39 THE INTERSECTION OF PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 309 TO THE BORDER OF
40 BERKS COUNTY, AS HEROES HIGHWAY, IN HONOR OF FALLEN
41 FIREFIGHTER MARVIN GRUBER AND ASSISTANT FIRE CHIEF ZACHARY
42 PARIS; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 47515,
43 CARRYING PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 286 OVER BLACKLEGS CREEK IN
44 CONEMAUGH TOWNSHIP, INDIANA COUNTY, AS THE CAPTAIN ROBERT M.
45 YOUNG MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS
46 BRIDGE KEY 8574, CARRYING STATE ROUTE 1021 OVER CLEARFIELD
47 CREEK IN WHITE TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY, AS THE CHARLES OWEN
48 JENKINS, JR., MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE,
49 IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 45509, CARRYING U.S. ROUTE 40 OVER
50 PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 43 IN REDSTONE TOWNSHIP, FAYETTE COUNTY,
51 AS THE PFC JOHN BALOG MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE,
52 IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 47947, CARRYING STATE ROUTE 1054
53 OVER INDIAN CREEK IN SALTICK TOWNSHIP, FAYETTE COUNTY, AS
54 THE SGT. EARL D. BARKLEY MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING THE
55 SECTION OF STATE ROUTE 403, ALSO KNOWN AS CRAMER PIKE, FROM
56 THE INTERSECTION WITH STATE ROUTE 3041 IN WEST TAYLOR
57 TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY, TO THE INTERSECTION WITH STATE
58 ROUTE 8010, SEGMENT 250 (RAMP E) IN EAST WHEATFIELD TOWNSHIP,
59 INDIANA COUNTY, AS THE CAPTAIN HARRY G. CRAMER MEMORIAL
60 HIGHWAY; AND MAKING REPEALS.

1 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
2 hereby enacts as follows:

3 Section 1. Sergeant Vance Stephan Keslar Memorial Bridge.

4 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
5 follows:

6 (1) Sergeant Vance Stephan Keslar was born in
7 Beaverdale, Cambria County.

8 (2) Sergeant Keslar dropped out of school and joined the
9 Civilian Conservation Corps.

10 (3) Later, Sergeant Keslar joined the United States Army
11 as a private.

12 (4) Sergeant Keslar was at Schofield Barracks on
13 December 7, 1941.

14 (5) As the Japanese reached Pearl Harbor, Sergeant
15 Keslar led a charge to the ammunition depot where the group
16 was told by the supply sergeant that he had no orders to
17 release weapons.

18 (6) Sergeant Keslar and others pushed aside the supply
19 sergeant and ran into the depot, grabbing old water-cooled
20 machine guns.

21 (7) Sergeant Keslar climbed to the top of the building
22 and started firing at the Japanese forces.

23 (8) Sergeant Keslar was awarded a Bronze Star for his
24 heroic actions during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

25 (9) Sergeant Keslar returned home and enrolled in the
26 Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

27 (10) Before receiving his bachelor's degree, Sergeant
28 Keslar earned his GED.

29 (11) Sergeant Keslar passed away on July 22, 2003.

30 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 8537,

1 carrying Pennsylvania Route 869, over a tributary of the Little
2 Conemaugh River in Jackson Township, Cambria County, is
3 designated as the Sergeant Vance Stephan Keslar Memorial Bridge.

4 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
5 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
6 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

7 Section 2. U.S. Army Technical Sergeant Joseph F. Johnston
8 Memorial Bridge.

9 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
10 follows:

11 (1) Technical Sergeant Joseph F. Johnston was born
12 November 27, 1917, and grew up in Dean, Cambria County.

13 (2) He was a 1938 graduate of Cresson High School.

14 (3) In June 1941, Technical Sergeant Johnston enlisted
15 in the United States Army and was assigned to the 9th
16 Division, 39th Infantry Regiment where he became a technical
17 sergeant and platoon leader.

18 (4) Technical Sergeant Johnston's service took him to
19 every Atlantic theater of action including the United
20 Kingdom, North Africa and most of Western Europe.

21 (5) Technical Sergeant Johnston fought in Algeria,
22 Morocco, Tunisia, Sicily, Normandy, England, Belgium and
23 Germany and was at the invasion of Normandy on June 12, 1944.

24 (6) During the battles of Tunisia, Technical Sergeant
25 Johnston, then a corporal, took command of his platoon in the
26 absence of his platoon leader and sergeant. In blackout
27 conditions, Technical Sergeant Johnston led his platoon under
28 heavy enemy shelling and machine gun fire and through
29 difficult mountainous terrain to deliver supplies to those
30 fighting on the front lines.

1 (7) For his actions during the battles of Tunisia,
2 Technical Sergeant Johnston was awarded the Legion of Merit.

3 (8) Technical Sergeant Johnston also received a Bronze
4 Star and Sliver Star for his service to our country.

5 (9) Technical Sergeant Johnston passed away on November
6 7, 2010.

7 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 8392,
8 carrying Pennsylvania Route 53, over Bruebaker Run in Dean
9 Township, Cambria County, is designated as the U.S. Army
10 Technical Sergeant Joseph F. Johnston Memorial Bridge.

11 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
12 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
13 traffic in both directions on the bridge.
14 Section 3. Technical Sergeant Mike Capelli Memorial Bridge.

15 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
16 follows:

17 (1) Technical Sergeant Mike Capelli was born in Nanty
18 Glo, Cambria County, on May 15, 1918.

19 (2) He served in the United States Army during World War
20 II as part of Company I, 180th Infantry Regiment, 45th
21 Infantry Division.

22 (3) He was wounded many times and performed many acts of
23 heroism for which he was decorated during his tours of Italy,
24 Germany and France.

25 (4) On May 28, 1944, in Aprilia, Italy, Technical
26 Sergeant Capelli's squad was impeded by the enemy's machine
27 guns. Technical Sergeant Capelli deployed his men and led
28 them in an assault on the enemy's position. Although
29 outnumbered and faced with intense fire, he succeeded after
30 fierce hand-to-hand fighting in destroying the enemy

1 position. For these actions, he was awarded an Oak Leaf
2 Cluster to his Silver Star Medal.

3 (5) On January 8, 1945, in Wildenguth, France, Technical
4 Sergeant Capelli was shot and killed while organizing his men
5 during an attack by a reinforced band of German SS Troopers.

6 (6) His awards include the Silver Star with Oak Leaf
7 Cluster, Bronze Star and Purple Heart with two Oak Leaf
8 Clusters.

9 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
10 43267, on that portion of State Route 3041, also known as
11 Dishong Mountain Road, over U.S. Route 22 in Jackson Township,
12 Cambria County, is designated as the Technical Sergeant Mike
13 Capelli Memorial Bridge.

14 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
15 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
16 traffic in both directions on the bridge and both directions on
17 the crossing route.

18 SECTION 4. CAPTAIN RAYMOND W. CALLAHAN, JR., MEMORIAL BRIDGE. <--

19 (A) FINDINGS.--THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINDS AND DECLARES AS
20 FOLLOWS:

21 (1) CAPTAIN RAYMOND W. CALLAHAN, JR., WAS BORN SEPTEMBER
22 11, 1946.

23 (2) CAPTAIN CALLAHAN GRADUATED FROM GREATER JOHNSTOWN
24 HIGH SCHOOL IN 1964.

25 (3) FOLLOWING GRADUATION, CAPTAIN CALLAHAN ENROLLED AT
26 INDIANA UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA.

27 (4) CAPTAIN CALLAHAN ENLISTED IN THE UNITED STATES ARMY
28 IN 1966.

29 (5) CAPTAIN CALLAHAN WAS COMMISSIONED IN 1967, FOLLOWING
30 HIS GRADUATION FROM OFFICER CANDIDATE SCHOOL AT FORT KNOX,

1 KENTUCKY.

2 (6) CAPTAIN CALLAHAN COMPLETED HELICOPTER TRAINING AT
3 FORT WOLTERS, TEXAS, AND COMPLETED A COURSE IN SPECIAL
4 WELFARE AT THE JOHN F. KENNEDY CENTER AT FORT BRAGG, NORTH
5 CAROLINA.

6 (7) CAPTAIN CALLAHAN WAS PROMOTED TO FIRST LIEUTENANT IN
7 1968 AND WAS FURTHER PROMOTED TO CAPTAIN SHORTLY BEFORE HIS
8 DEATH.

9 (8) CAPTAIN CALLAHAN WAS KILLED IN THE LINE OF DUTY IN
10 PHUOC LONG PROVINCE IN THE CENTRAL HIGHLANDS OF SOUTH
11 VIETNAM, NEAR THE CAMBODIAN BORDER ON FEBRUARY 23, 1969.

12 (9) CAPTAIN CALLAHAN WAS AWARDED THE BRONZE STAR, THE
13 PURPLE HEART, THE NATIONAL DEFENSE SERVICE MEDAL, THE VIETNAM
14 SERVICE MEDAL AND THE VIETNAM CAMPAIGN RIBBON.

15 (B) DESIGNATION.--THE BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY
16 45701, CARRYING PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 403 OVER THE CONEMAUGH RIVER
17 BETWEEN JOHNSTOWN CITY AND WEST TAYLOR TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY,
18 IS DESIGNATED AS THE CAPTAIN RAYMOND W. CALLAHAN, JR., MEMORIAL
19 BRIDGE.

20 (C) SIGNS.--THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION SHALL ERECT AND
21 MAINTAIN APPROPRIATE SIGNS DISPLAYING THE NAME OF THE BRIDGE TO
22 TRAFFIC IN BOTH DIRECTIONS ON THE BRIDGE.

23 SECTION 5. CPL REID REX ROSS 3 BT 26 MARINE REG. MEMORIAL
24 BRIDGE.

25 (A) FINDINGS.--THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINDS AND DECLARES AS
26 FOLLOWS:

27 (1) CPL REID REX ROSS WAS BORN APRIL 27, 1949.

28 (2) CPL ROSS SERVED IN THE UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS
29 WITH COMPANY I, THIRD BATTALION, TWENTY-SIXTH MARINES, FIRST
30 MARINE DIVISION.

1 (3) ON DECEMBER 4, 1968, COMPANY I WAS PARTICIPATING IN
2 OPERATION MEADE RIVER SOUTH OF DANANG WHEN THE MARINES WERE
3 PINNED DOWN BY ENEMY FIRE. CPL ROSS MOVED FROM ONE POSITION
4 TO ANOTHER TO DETERMINE AMMUNITION REQUIREMENTS AND PROVIDE
5 ENCOURAGEMENT TO HIS MEN.

6 (4) CPL ROSS HEROICALLY MOVED THROUGH INTENSE FIRE AND
7 HURLED HAND GRENADES AND FIRED SEVERAL LIGHT ANTITANK ASSAULT
8 WEAPONS AT THE ENEMY.

9 (5) CPL ROSS DIRECTED HIS MEN TO A MORE SECURE AREA
10 WHILE PERSONALLY PROVIDING COVERING FIRE FOR THEM.

11 (6) CPL ROSS OBSERVED TWO CASUALTIES LYING IN AN AREA
12 EXPOSED TO THE ENEMY AND MANNED AN M-60 MACHINE GUN AND
13 RETURNED FIRE, ALLOWING FOR AN EVACUATION TEAM TO RETRIEVE
14 THE TWO INDIVIDUALS.

15 (7) CPL ROSS WAS KILLED WHILE PROVIDING RETURN FIRE TO
16 PROTECT HIS TEAM.

17 (8) CPL ROSS WAS AWARDED THE SILVER STAR FOR HIS SERVICE
18 AND SACRIFICE FOR OUR COUNTRY.

19 (B) DESIGNATION.--THE BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 8569,
20 CARRYING STATE ROUTE 1021 OVER GLENDALE LAKE IN WHITE TOWNSHIP,
21 CAMBRIA COUNTY, IS DESIGNATED AS THE CPL REID REX ROSS 3 BT 26
22 MARINE REG. MEMORIAL BRIDGE.

23 (C) SIGNS.--THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION SHALL ERECT AND
24 MAINTAIN APPROPRIATE SIGNS DISPLAYING THE NAME OF THE BRIDGE TO
25 TRAFFIC IN BOTH DIRECTIONS ON THE BRIDGE.

26 SECTION 6. SGT. JOHN C. ALAIMO MEMORIAL BRIDGE.

27 (A) FINDINGS.--THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINDS AND DECLARES AS
28 FOLLOWS:

29 (1) SGT. JOHN C. ALAIMO WAS BORN MAY 31, 1948.

30 (2) SGT. ALAIMO SERVED IN THE UNITED STATES ARMY WITH

1 COMPANY A, 2ND BATTALION, 16TH INFANTRY REGIMENT, 2ND
2 BRIGADE, 1ST INFANTRY DIVISION DURING THE VIETNAM WAR.

3 (3) SGT. ALAIMO WAS KILLED IN ACTION IN BIEN HOA ON
4 APRIL 8, 1969.

5 (B) DESIGNATION.--THE BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY
6 56008, CARRYING PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 403 OVER STONYCREEK RIVER IN
7 JOHNSTOWN CITY, CAMBRIA COUNTY, IS DESIGNATED AS THE SGT. JOHN
8 C. ALAIMO MEMORIAL BRIDGE.

9 (C) SIGNS.--THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION SHALL ERECT AND
10 MAINTAIN APPROPRIATE SIGNS DISPLAYING THE NAME OF THE BRIDGE TO
11 TRAFFIC IN BOTH DIRECTIONS ON THE BRIDGE.

12 SECTION 7. PFC STANLEY ALBERT STYS MEMORIAL BRIDGE.

13 (A) FINDINGS.--THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINDS AND DECLARES AS
14 FOLLOWS:

15 (1) PFC STANLEY ALBERT STYS WAS BORN OCTOBER 1, 1949.

16 (2) PFC STYS GRADUATED FROM JOHNSTOWN HIGH SCHOOL IN
17 1967.

18 (3) PFC STYS SERVED WITH COMPANY D, 1ST BATTALION, 502ND
19 INFANTRY REGIMENT, 101ST AIRBORNE DIVISION IN THE UNITED
20 STATES ARMY.

21 (4) ON MARCH 6, 1968, PFC STYS WAS KILLED IN ACTION IN
22 THE THUA THIEN PROVINCE.

23 (B) DESIGNATION.--THE BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 8444,
24 CARRYING US ROUTE 219 OVER PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 56, ALSO KNOWN AS
25 SCALP AVENUE, IN RICHLAND TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY, IS
26 DESIGNATED AS THE PFC STANLEY ALBERT STYS MEMORIAL BRIDGE.

27 (C) SIGNS.--THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION SHALL ERECT AND
28 MAINTAIN APPROPRIATE SIGNS DISPLAYING THE NAME OF THE BRIDGE TO
29 TRAFFIC IN BOTH DIRECTIONS ON THE CROSSING ROUTE.

30 SECTION 8. PFC CYRIL T. YECKLEY MEMORIAL BRIDGE.

1 (A) FINDINGS.--THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINDS AND DECLARES AS
2 FOLLOWS:

3 (1) PFC CYRIL T. YECKLEY WAS BORN OCTOBER 20, 1945, IN

23 (7) SERGEANT DRISKEL WAS POSTHUMOUSLY AWARDED THE PURPLE

25 (8) SERGEANT DRISKEL IS BURIED AT THE NETHERLANDS
26 AMERICAN CEMETERY IN MARGRATEN, NETHERLANDS, WHICH MIA
27 WETZLER TOOK CARE OF FOR 52 YEARS AS A DISPLAY OF HER
28 GRATITUDE FOR THE SACRIFICE GIVEN FOR THE LIBERATION OF HER
29 COUNTRY, THE NETHERLANDS.

30 (B) DESIGNATION.--THE BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 8555,

14 (2) FIREFIGHTER GRUBER AND ASSISTANT FIRE CHIEF PARIS
15 WERE AMONG SCORES OF FIREFIGHTERS CALLED TO A HOUSE FIRE ON
16 DECEMBER 7, 2022.

17 (3) FIREFIGHTER GRUBER AND ASSISTANT FIRE CHIEF PARIS
18 WERE TRAPPED IN THE BLAZE AND TRAGICALLY LOST THEIR LIVES IN
19 THE LINE OF DUTY.

20 (4) FIREFIGHTER GRUBER AND ASSISTANT FIRE CHIEF PARIS
21 WERE 59 YEARS OF AGE AND 36 YEARS OF AGE, RESPECTIVELY, AT
22 THE TIME OF THEIR DEATHS.

23 (B) DESIGNATION.--THE PORTION OF PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 143 IN

8 (2) CAPTAIN YOUNG GRADUATED FROM SALTSBURG HIGH SCHOOL
9 AND ATTENDED INDIANA UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA, WHERE HE WAS
10 COMMISSIONED THROUGH THE ARMY ROTC ON MAY 28, 1967.

11 (3) CAPTAIN YOUNG WENT ON TO ATTEND INFANTRY SCHOOL,
12 RANGER SCHOOL AND ARMOR SCHOOL BEFORE SERVING WITH COMPANY A,
13 2ND BATTALION, 36TH INFANTRY REGIMENT OF THE 3RD ARMORED
14 DIVISION IN EUROPE FROM JANUARY 1968 TO AUGUST 1969.

15 (4) CAPTAIN YOUNG WAS TRANSFERRED TO THE 184TH ORDNANCE
16 BATTALION IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM AND SERVED AS THE
17 COMMANDER OF THE 630TH ORDNANCE COMPANY FROM AUGUST 1969
18 UNTIL JANUARY 1970, WHEN HE WAS TRANSFERRED TO THE INFANTRY
19 BRANCH AND SERVED WITH HEADQUARTERS 2ND BATTALION, 34TH
20 ARMORED REGIMENT OF THE 25TH INFANTRY DIVISION.

21 (5) ON MAY 2, 1970, CAPTAIN YOUNG WAS A PASSENGER ABOARD
22 A UH-1H IROQUOIS HELICOPTER ON A LOGISTICAL SUPPORT MISSION

24 (6) DURING ITS FLIGHT, THE HELICOPTER SUSTAINED DAMAGE
25 FROM GROUND FIRE AND WAS FORCED TO MAKE AN EMERGENCY LANDING

7 HIS ILLNESS WHILE IN CAPTIVITY.

8 (10) BECAUSE OF HIS VALOR AND COURAGE WHILE SERVING AS A
9 PRISONER OF WAR IN CAMBODIA, CAPTAIN YOUNG WAS AWARDED THE
10 SILVER STAR.

11 (11) CAPTAIN YOUNG'S REMAINS RETURNED TO THE UNITED
12 STATES ON DECEMBER 7, 1997, AND HE IS BURIED IN EDGEWOOD
13 CEMETERY IN SALTSBURG.

14 (B) DESIGNATION.--THE BRIDGE, IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY
15 47515, CARRYING PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 286 OVER BLACKLEGS CREEK IN

29 OBTAINING THE RANK OF SERGEANT AND SERVING DURING THE VIETNAM
30 WAR WHERE HE BEGAN HIS TOUR OF DUTY ON FEBRUARY 23, 1965.

1 (4) SERGEANT JENKINS' MILITARY OCCUPATION OR SPECIALTY
2 WAS LIGHT WEAPONS INFANTRY, AND HE WAS ATTACHED TO THE
3 SPECIAL FORCES, 5TH SPECIAL FORCES GROUP, A5 414.

4 (5) DURING HIS SERVICE IN THE VIETNAM WAR, SERGEANT
5 JENKINS WAS REPORTED MISSING NEAR DONG XOAI, PHUOC LONG
6 PROVINCE, SOUTH VIETNAM, AND DECLARED DEAD ON JUNE 10, 1965.

25 (3) ON SEPTEMBER 6, 1950, PFC BALOG WAS DEFENDING HIS
26 POSITION AGAINST ENEMY FIRE NEAR AM-SIM, SOUTH KOREA. WHEN IT
27 BECAME NECESSARY FOR HIS RIFLE TEAM TO WITHDRAW, HE

17 (4) CAPTAIN CRAMER BECAME AN ORIGINAL "GREEN BERET" WHEN
18 THE SPECIAL FORCES WERE FORMED IN THE EARLY 1950S.

19 (5) CAPTAIN CRAMER LED THE FIRST TEAM OF GREEN BERETS TO
20 VIETNAM IN 1957.

21 (6) CAPTAIN CRAMER WAS KILLED IN VIETNAM IN AN AMBUSH ON
22 OCTOBER 21, 1957.

23 (7) CAPTAIN CRAMER WAS BURIED AT HIS ALMA MATER, WEST
24 POINT.
