A RESOLUTION

- 1 Condemning elected members who believe that the mistreatment of workers, including the elimination of water breaks in high-
- temperature conditions, is acceptable.
- 4 WHEREAS, The recent passage of House Bill No. 2127 by the
- 5 Texas Legislature and its subsequent approval by Governor Greg
- 6 Abbott has eliminated local rules and ordinances mandating water
- 7 breaks for construction workers; and
- 8 WHEREAS, The elimination of these important regulations
- 9 undermines the safety and well-being of construction workers,
- 10 particularly in a state like Texas, where high temperatures pose
- 11 a serious health risk; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The supporters of this law argue that it will
- 13 eliminate a supposed patchwork of local rules and ordinances and
- 14 reduce burdensome regulations on businesses, but fail to
- 15 acknowledge the human cost of such measures; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Data from the United States Bureau of Labor
- 17 Statistics show that Texas has the highest number of heat-
- 18 related deaths among workers and these numbers are likely

- 1 underreported; and
- 2 WHEREAS, The impact of this law disproportionately affects
- 3 Latino construction workers who make up a significant portion of
- 4 the workforce in Texas; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Extreme heat waves are becoming increasingly
- 6 dangerous due to climate change and the elimination of mandated
- 7 water breaks further exacerbates the risks faced by workers; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Workers' unions and rights advocates have voiced
- 9 concerns regarding the potential increase in heat-related deaths
- 10 if water breaks are no longer mandated; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Proponents of House Bill No. 2127 suggest that
- 12 Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) regulations
- 13 are sufficient to ensure worker safety, disregarding the fact
- 14 that OSHA does not have a national standard for heat-related
- 15 illnesses; and
- 16 WHEREAS, The former head of OSHA, David Michaels, contends
- 17 that local rules and ordinances are crucial for saving lives and
- 18 that without them, workers will be severely injured or killed;
- 19 and
- 20 WHEREAS, The elimination of local rules and ordinances does
- 21 not only affect the safety and well-being of workers, but also
- 22 undermines the power of local governments to protect and serve
- 23 their constituents; therefore be it
- 24 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives condemn elected
- 25 members who believe that the mistreatment of workers, including
- 26 the elimination of water breaks in high-temperature conditions,
- 27 is acceptable; and be it further
- 28 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives express its deep
- 29 frustration and disappointment with elected members who have
- 30 supported and enacted legislation that eliminates critical

- 1 worker protections; and be it further
- 2 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives call upon elected
- 3 members to recognize the importance of local regulations in
- 4 safeguarding workers and to reject any attempts to override
- 5 local rules and ordinances for the sake of supposed business
- 6 interests; and be it further
- 7 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives stand united in
- 8 our commitment to advocate for the rights of workers and demand
- 9 better treatment, firmly believing that no worker should be
- 10 denied basic rights and protections in the pursuit of their
- 11 livelihoods.
